# Jesus Giving Us All Life though His Death

In this coming Sunday's Gospel Jesus says, "the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified" (John 12:23). Leading up to this, Jesus has said several times in John's Gospel that His hour has not come. For instance, when the wine ran out at the wedding feast of Cana, the mother of Jesus said to Jesus that they have no wine. Jesus replied, "woman what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." (John 2:4). Right

up to this point the hour has always been in the future. But here in chapter 12, Jesus' hour has come, and the hour is, of course, the hour of his death and glorification.

Jesus likens his death to sowing a seed into the ground. "I tell you most solemnly, unless a wheat grain falls on the ground and dies, it remains only a single grain. But if it dies, it yields a rich harvest." (John 12:24). Jesus has already spoken of His death in life giving terms. Last Sunday's gospel, for example, which came from chapter 3 of John's gospel, Jesus alluded to an incident in the Book of Numbers. During the Exodus, the people were saved from poisonous serpents by looking upon the effigy of the bronze serpent raised up by Moses. Likewise, humanity has been smitten with a deadly disease, and the only cure is to look at the Son of Man dying on the cross and find life through believing in Him.

In this coming Sunday's Gospel, the image is not of Jesus being "lifted up", but of Him falling into the ground like a seed and dying. The seed is Jesus Himself, who by dying will give life to humanity. Just as the seed must die to its life as a single seed before it can yield an abundant harvest, Jesus will bring life in abundance through his death on the cross.

Jesus then returns to the image of being "lifted up". He says, "now sentence has been passed on this world. Now the Prince of this world is to be overthrown and when I am lifted up from the earth I shall draw all people to myself." (John 12:31-32). Here we have the answer that Jesus gives to the Greeks who want to see Him at the beginning of this coming Sunday's Gospel. These gentile Greeks will truly see Jesus, but only when he is "lifted up". The Greek word that John uses for "lifted up" is deliberately ambiguous. It can refer to a crucifixion, to a person being "lifted up" on the cross. But it can also refer to an enthronement to a person being "lifted up" to a position of king and ruler. The Gospel of John is using the word in both senses. The Cross, which is an excruciating instrument of torture and death is also a throne from which Jesus reigns triumphantly. Giving life in the Kingdom of God to all who look upon it through the eyes of faith.

## **Our Lenten Journey**

Lent is a time where we prepare ourselves for the celebration of the Paschal Mystery at Easter. The Paschal Mystery being the Suffering, Death and Resurrection of Jesus, which is the foundation of our faith.

Lent began on Ash Wednesday and will conclude before the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. During this time neither the Gloria nor the Alleluia are sung or said.

Purple is the liturgical colour for Lent and has a twofold significance. Purple is widely recognised as the colour of mourning, alluding to the impending suffering of Jesus' crucifixion, yet it is also associated with royalty and heralds Christ resurrection and sovereignty.

During Lent we make a concerted effort to deepen our relationship with Jesus. We do this through Prayer, Fasting and Acts of Charity.

Below is what we are doing as a parish as we journey together during Lent to the Paschal celebrations at Easter.

Archbishop Mark Coleridge (Archbishop of Brisbane) writes: A Resurrected Life will invite you to believe in the extraordinary hope that the Gospel bears – a hope grounded in a God who transfigures our wounds, which become fountains of healing and life for those around s and for the world.

The theme of Project Compassion is For All Future Generations. It reminds us that what we do today can have an impact for all future generations. This message invites us to step up for those who do not have the essential

resources they need for their survival, and those whose needs at this time are far beyond our own. By putting compassion into action, we can make a difference today, for all future

Our Justice and Peace group will be helping with the promotion of Project Compassion again this year. Members will be handing out the Project Compassion envelopes at the beginning of each Mass, and will be playing the videos of each project before each Mass during Lent. They hope to bring Project Compassion to life in the St Benedict's Parish, making it an inspiring and rewarding experience for everyone.

# The Way of the Cross by Elizabeth Harrington

Stations of the Cross is a popular practice in parishes during Lent. This form of devotion arose after pilgrims began to visit the Holy Land from the end of the 4th century to follow the path that Jesus trod in his last week of life. Christians who were unable to travel to Palestine themselves reproduced a parallel devotion at home.

The Franciscans popularised the practice during the Middle Ages, but the number and subject of the stations was not settled until the 18th century. The fourteen stations that were established were a blend of biblical and legendary material.

There is no set way of praying the Stations and the Church has never provided an official ritual for the celebration. In 1975 the Congregation for Sacred Rites suggested a list of Stations of the Cross that is more in keeping with the gospel accounts than the traditional form. It begins with the Last Supper and concludes with Christ's resurrection. Recent popes have used yet another set of Stations when celebrating the Way of Cross at the Colosseum during Holy Week.

The terms "Stations of the Cross" and "Way of the Cross" refer to the same devotional practice. The latter may be better as it emphasises the spiritual journey aspect of the prayer. Official guidelines for celebrating the Way of the Cross suggest that it is always preferable to choose texts written in a clear simple style and to end the celebration with a commemoration of the Lord's resurrection "to leave the faithful with a sense of expectation of the resurrection in faith and hope".





The follow up messages attempt to persuade you that the priests' urgent need can only be solved by the purchase of Gift cards or similar. Hitting the delete button is the best way to deal with these pests and scam artists. Should you be concerned, or should you receive this type of message, please contact your Parish Office.

# Financially Supporting Our St Benedict's Parish

To everyone who actively contributes financially to the life of our St Benedict's Parish. Thank you! Without you we would not be able to operate as a parish.

We know that the only stable and recurring income that our parish receives is from the **support of our Planned Giving Program**. At present, we are not receiving enough income from our Planned Giving to meet the financial cost of running the parish.

There is a need to increase our collections by \$2000 a week inorder-to plug the gap when we are no longer eligible to receive the current level of subsidies from the Archdiocese, which will cease in 2024. Also, as I have said, after a church is built there will be additional operating costs such as insurance, maintenance, utility bills etc.

Please, I am asking every parishioner to commit some of your TREASURE and help make our dream become a reality. Our Parish Pledge Card is available at the Mass centre; asking everyone to commit to the Planned Giving Program. If you are already in the Planned Giving Program, we are asking you to at least continue and if possible increase your financial support. 500 people on average attend Mass each week and we have 83 families that contribute to the Parish through the Parish Planned Giving Program.

If you are not yet part of our Planned Giving Program, then please join and make a commitment to our Parish. There are three (3) options to financially contribute to the running of the parish. These are:

# St Benedict's Parish Safeguarding.
