Palm Branches – Victory Over the Powers of Sin and Death

We begin Mass this coming Sunday with an opening procession marking the beginning of Holy Week. Here we commemorate Jesus' entry into Jerusalem for our salvation through His Pascall Mystery.

It is important to note that the crowd welcomes Jesus with palms, which are a symbol of hope that Jesus is the one they have been waiting for - the new David. The people hoped that Jesus is the one who will overthrow the might of imperial Rome.

Jesus was dealt with a similar scenario earlier in John's gospel when He fed thousands of people from five loaves and two fish. The people were amazed and wanted to make him king. If he can feed thousands of people from five loaves and two fish, then He is surely the one who will set us from Roman occupation. But the gospel then tells us that Jesus could see they were about to come and take Him by force and make him King, so he escaped back to the mountain by Himself.

The same thing is happening here on Palm Sunday. As Jesus passes by, the people acclaim Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! He is the king of Israel! Jesus knows what is on their minds, and by way of response He does not call for a chariot or a War Horse. That is not who Jesus is. Instead, Jesus finds a young donkey and sits upon it. This is Jesus' powerful, but silent, reply to what the people are hoping for by waving their palm branches.

Mark's account of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem alludes to Zechariah's prophetic vision of the city of Jerusalem shouting acclamation to a victorious king who rides humbly on a donkey. Pope Benedict XVI offers this reflection: *this passage announces a poor king. A king whose rule does not depend on political and military might. Jesus' inmost being is humility and meekness. In this Jesus is the exact opposite of the great kings of the world, which is vividly illustrated by the fact that he rides on a donkey, the mount of the poor. This is the counter image of the chariot that He rejects. Jesus is bringing the Kingdom of God, and He has made it clear that this Kingdom will be established by means of rejection, death, and resurrection.*

In the city of David, Jesus is not interested in setting up a new Kingdom of political power. Jesus' kingdom is a kingdom in which the poor and humiliated of this earth, whom Jesus called blessed, would finally share in those goods to which they are entitled. Jesus is indeed the true king, but not the king expected by the crowds who welcomed Him into Jerusalem with palm branches and a royal acclamation. Jesus is a king whose rule does not depend on political and military might. Jesus will set His people free, but not freedom from a foreign invader. Jesus will win a victory over a far more powerful and insidious foe. It will not be a victory won by military might. On the Friday of this week, Jesus will be lifted-up on the cross. His victorious death on the cross will set us free from the powers of sin and death.

Palm Sunday (Elizabeth Harrington)

A feature of the liturgy on Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord is the commemoration of the Lord's entrance into Jerusalem which includes the procession of branches. This is not intended to be a re-enactment of Christ's entry into Jerusalem.

The Church's liturgy does not re-enact past events but is rather a living encounter with the whole mystery of Jesus' incarnation, ministry, death, and resurrection to glory. The proclamation of the story of Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem, waving branches and processing together as a pilgrim people are ritual actions which help us call to mind a key event in our salvation history.

By participating in the Commemoration of the Lord's Entrance into Jerusalem, we symbolise our commitment to complete the initial victory that Christ has won. We joyfully join ourselves to Christ, making his passion our own. We share in his suffering so that we may share in his glory.

The readings and prayers set down for Palm Sunday clearly proclaim that, just as there is no cross without the resurrection, there is no resurrection without the cross.

Easter Triduum (Elizabeth Harrington)

The term "Triduum" refers to the period of three days starting on Holy Thursday evening, continuing through Good Friday and Holy Saturday and ending with Mass or evening prayer on Easter Sunday evening.

Key liturgical celebrations of the Triduum are the Mass of the Lord's Supper, the Passion of the Lord on Good Friday and the Easter Vigil in the Holy Night.

Busy people may be tempted to attend just one of these, perhaps Good Friday because of the moving veneration of the cross, or the Easter Vigil because it's the main celebration of the

period, although it starts later than the normal Saturday evening Mass and lasts much longer!

But to miss any of the three liturgies of the Easter Triduum is like missing one act of a three-act play. The Triduum is really one three-day-long liturgy. This is illustrated clearly when we consider how the liturgies of this period begin and end.

The Mass on Holy Thursday evening begins in the usual way, but there is no blessing or dismissal at the end. Instead there is a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the place of reservation. People depart in silence. The Good Friday liturgy begins with a silent procession, a period of silent prayer, and the opening prayer. It finishes with the prayer over the people. Again there is no final blessing or dismissal and people depart in silence.

At the Easter Vigil we gather around a fire in silent darkness for the blessing of the fire and the lighting of the paschal candle. The liturgy concludes with the joyful paschal dismissal "Go in peace, alleluia, alleluia" as we process out to the sounds of the triumphant Easter hymn.

The three-day liturgy, which began with the entrance and greeting on Holy Thursday evening, has moved us from suffering through death to resurrection. The whole Easter mystery is celebrated from a different point of view on each of the three days.

Our Lenten Journey



Lent is a time where we prepare ourselves for the celebration of the Paschal Mystery at Easter. The Paschal Mystery being the Suffering, Death and Resurrection of Jesus, which is the foundation of our faith.

Lent began on Ash Wednesday and will conclude before the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. During this time neither the Gloria nor the Alleluia are sung or said.

Purple is the liturgical colour for Lent and has a twofold significance. Purple is widely recognised as the colour of mourning, alluding to the impending suffering of Jesus' crucifixion, yet it is also associated with royalty and heralds Christ resurrection and sovereignty.

During Lent we make a concerted effort to deepen our relationship with Jesus. We do this through Prayer, Fasting and Acts of Charity.

Below is what we are doing as a parish as we journey together during Lent to the Paschal celebrations at Easter.

Financially Supporting Our St Benedict's Parish

To everyone who actively contributes financially to the life of our St Benedict's Parish. Thank you! Without you we would not be able to operate as a parish.

We know that the only stable and recurring income that our parish receives is from the **support of our Planned Giving Program**. At present, we are not receiving enough income from our Planned Giving to meet the financial cost of running the parish.

There is a need to increase our collections by \$2000 a week in order to plug the gap when we are no longer eligible to receive the current level of subsidies from the Archdiocese, which will cease in 2024. Also, as I have said, after a church is built there will be additional operating costs such as insurance, maintenance, utility bills etc.

Please, I am asking every parishioner to commit some of your **TREASURE** and help make our dream become a reality. Our Parish Pledge Card is available at the Mass centre; asking everyone to **commit to the Planned Giving Program**. If you are already in the Planned Giving Program, we are asking you to at least continue and if possible increase your financial support. 500 people on average attend Mass each week and we have 83 families that contribute to the Parish through the Parish Planned Giving Program.

If you are not yet part of our Planned Giving Program, then please join and make a commitment to our Parish. There are three (3) options to financially contribute to the running of the parish. These are:

On this Pledge Card we will have an opportunity to support both:

The follow up messages attempt to persuade you that the priests' urgent need can only be solved by the purchase of Gift cards or similar. *Hitting the delete button is the best way to deal with these pests and scam artists.* Should you be concerned, or should you receive this type of message, please contact your Parish Office.

St Benedict's Parish Safeguarding.

Safeguarding requirements for Volunteers in Parishes are constantly under review from the Archdiocese. A number of our Volunteer roles are no longer in need of Blue Cards or Police Checks.
